Section 2

Suggested length of time: 10 – 15 mins. Children do not need to be in a particular part of the Museum to complete these questions.

Remains of wood and other plants, animals and people usually rot and don't survive for very long. Although plastic lasts a very long time underground, it has only been made in the last hundred years.

The places where plants, animals and people are more likely to survive are a very dry place (such as a desert in Egypt) or a very wet place (such as underwater or in very wet ground like peat).
